Rural Women's Summit Aides Arrested Women

"Whereas, the conviction and jailing of Maggie Bozeman and Julia Wilder has far reaching effects in their conviction affects all people's right to wote and participate in the electoral process so vital to life in America... Be it Therefore Resolved, that the Southern Rural Women's Network takes the position that Maggie Bozeman and Julia Wilder are political prisoners."

The statement comes from a resolution adopted by the Southern Rural, Women's Network in support of Maggie Bozeman-Julia Wilder and Extension of the Voting Rights Act.

The Southern Rural Women's Network, a regional coalition of rural women

with members and affiliates in five southern states has called a Rural Women's Summit and Caravan in support of two Alabama for voting fraud. The two women, Maggie Bozeman, 51, and Julia Wilder, 69, are sentenced to four and five years in prison. They are presently on work release in Tuskegee, Alabama. The emphasis of the Summit is on the need for unity, Bozeman-Wilder, and the Voting Rights Act. The meeting will be held in Aliceville, Alabama on April 17 at Aliceville High School beginning at 9 a.m. and will include national, regional, and local speakers. Speakers and panelists include Norma Powell, Birmingham, Communications Workers of
