



Swinging lethal left hooks to the body and hard, staggering rights to the head, Joe Louis, Tuesday night, gave the finest demonstration of his entire meteoric heavyweight fighting career and sent James J. Braddock, the fighting Irishman, careening to the canvas in one minute and ten seconds of the eighth round for the full count of ten. Louis entered the ring at 1974. Braddock at 197. The fatal blow was a terrific right that landed flush on the ex-champion's

LOUIS TAKES SIX ROUNDS

CHICAGO-(SNS)-Taking a brief but effective hombardment of left hooks and uppercuts to the jaw and head here Tuesday night, Joe Louis, at one time, looked more mussed up than at any previous time in his fighting career. Jim Braddock, the then champion. led this vicious assault in the second and fourth rounds, scoring a knockdown in the first stanza, and had Louis' nose bleeding badiy. Louis, however, had full command of the first, third, fifth, sixth, seventh, and, of course the eighth and final round of the fight when he dropped Braddock with a lethal right, flush to the jaw. The Irishman went out in a minute and ten seconds of that fateful stanza.

Forbears Have Louis' Worked Same 'Bama Farm Since Reconstruction

CHICAGO—(ANP)—Three generations of the Barrow family parents, grand-parents and great-grandparents of Henvyweight Champion Joe Louis—have worked the same 1-2 Section farm, 320 acres, in Chambers County, Ala., since Reconstruction days, it was revealed Monday with the visit here of Joe's uncle, Albert Barrow, to atchampionship fight at

cated near Lafayette, Ala., was bought by Louis' great-grandfather, Anthony Barrow, shortly after the close of the Civil War and at his death it reverted to Joe's grandfuffer, Alonzo Earrow, who, with his wife, Victoria, were the parents of 13 children, all of whom tilled the soil intensively in the produc-tion of cotton for which the soil was admirably suited. Round-By-Round Details

FIRST

Both fighters take center of ring. Braddock lands first blow, light right to Louis' face. They spar, Louis feints and lands two short lefts to face, and Braddock forces clinch, Braddock lands and misses left hook, takes right and left to heart in return. Louis lands first hard blows of round, left and right to body. Braddock counters with left and right, but is driven back with right and left just above shoulder. Louis, off balance, is knocked down by Braddock, but jumps up and lands a hard right and left to the jaw as the bell clangs.-LOUIS' ROUND.

SECOND

Louis lands left to head, Braddock counters with light left uppercut to chin. Both men spar about ring, then Braddock drives two hard lefts to Louis' head. two hard lefts to Louis head.

feints, but takes fast left and right
to body. Braddock's left eye is
bleeding and both are swollen.

Parks was said by police to have been stabbed by his brother-in-law, James Craig, at his home when the latter came to his child.
