Wilkins Calls Race Barriers a War Snag

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. -- Outlining a plan to remove the "racial barriers that are preventing colored Americans from doing their utmost in the war effort," Roy Wilkins, assistant secretary of the NAACP, declared at a mass meeting here this week that America is still failing to mobilize all

its people fully.
Wilkins further told his listeners that we are fighting dictatorship and assailed the poll tax, asserting that it "is intimately connected with the war effort, for when ten million Americans have to pay for the right to vote, that's like dictatorship."

To Wilkins, Governor John E. Niles sent greetings and stated

"The colored people of New Mexico have made a distinct contribution to the war effort through their volunteer services in the armed forces and through their purchases of war bonds. The continued wholehearted efforts of all our people will help to speed the day of victory."

que from El Paso in a tour of 10 Western States. He will leave here for Pueblo, Colorado, Wednesday, then he will speak at Colo-

rado Springs before returning to the national office of the NAACP in New York.
