EUCLID - CASE Shell Output Threatened

BY CHAS. H. LOEB The War Labor Board in the Cleveland area this week began to reap the whirlwind they planted some 18 months ago when they lowered the barriers against the importation into Ohio of thousands of southern immigrant workers.

Under the expediency of "war necessity" the southern hills of Kentucky, Alabama and Tennessee were scoured for southern poor whites who were induced to come North, bringing with them their died-in-the wool prejudices against Negroes. Meanwhile there were hundreds in every Ohio city who were, and still are being denied upgrading to skilled and semi-skilled jobs in war plants, the FEPC to the contrary notwithstanding.

In Cleveland, out at the Euclid-Case Foundry where they manufacture shells for 105 mm. Army guns, a number of these migrants were placed in the Casting Department. They were happy thereat \$15.00 per day, until dire necessity forced the company officials to place Negro workers in the (Continued on Page THREE-A)

Spokesman. for the striking wo kers are reported to have offered as their reason for striking their distaste for Negroes generally, and to have voiced strong opposition to the prospect of having to share a shower room with Negro workers.

The plant employs about 2000. workers, with the jobs being hele by Negro workers confined to the back breaking work dirty. of charging furnaces. There are no shower facilities provided for Negro workers in the plant, because their "southern white brothers" long ago protested that use of the showers by Negroes "uses up all the hot water from the whites," so that Negro workers must be content to "wash up" in face bowls before boarding street cars enroute home.
