

On the DIVORCE Docket



Mrs. Adalee M. Crew, 1351 E. 11th St., accused her husband, Rufus S. Crew of failure to be a kind and loving husband, developing a morose attitude toward her and their two children, and improper support, in a divorce suit she filed against him in Common Pleas Court last week.

Mrs. Crew averred in her suit that although her husband earns about \$400 per month he has refused in the past two weeks to provide the proper food and other necessities of life for his family.

Crew often becomes uncommunicative and won't talk to his wife and children for days at a time, the suit stated. The wife says she had the Bureau of Domestic Relations and Family Service call him in to see if they could improve his relationship with his family but this did not work either.

Now Mrs. Crew said she wants a divorce, custody of the children, alimony, support and that he be enjoined from disposing of his interest in their home and their automobile. In the final settlement she wants the home and car awarded to her as part of the alimony.

Other Divorce Action

Other action filed in Common Pleas Court last week included:

MARIAN ELIZABETH WILLIAMS 2201 E., 70th St., versus Hartford H. Williams. The couple married on Jan. 15, 1955. They have no children. She charged neglect and extreme cruelty.

DOROTHY WRIGHT, 1563 E. 38th St., versus Theodore Wright. This couple married at Covington, Ky., on Nov. 11, 1948 and have two children, with another on the way. She charged neglect and extreme cruelty.

Claiming that her husband has abused her she asked the court to grant her a restraining order to enjoin him from molesting her in any way. She wants their new Plymouth automobile, a divorce, cus-

tody of the children, the furniture and the car.

FRANCES THOMPSON FLOYD versus Harris Floyd. The couple married on April 15, 1946 and have two children whose ages are 9 and 3. She wants a divorce on the grounds of gross neglect and extreme cruelty, custody of the children, support and alimony.

Barber Shop Owner Sued

DORIS FLEMING, 14802 Kinsman versus Matthew. This couple was married at Cleveland on Aug. 17, 1952. They have no children.

Named parties to the suit were Edward Long, Esquire Barber Shop and Ralph Hainsworth, Society for Savings Bank and the Quincy Savings and Loan Association.

The wife said that Long and Hainsworth are partners with her husband in ownership of the Esquire Barber Shop. She wants them all enjoined from making any disposition of Fleming's interest in the shop.

Mrs. Fleming asked for a divorce, custody of the children, their 1954 Oldsmobile Holiday car, and alimony.

Society for Savings bank filed an answer to the suit stating that it has no funds on deposit for Fleming.

ELVIRA TATE, 5810 Outhwaite versus Robert Tate. This couple married Oct. 19, 1953. They have no children. The wife stated in her petition that her husband has beaten her on numerous occasions inflicting injuries.

Mrs. Tate also accused her husband of falsely accusing and having her incarcerated as a mental patient and perjuring himself regarding her in Probate Court. She was subsequently found sane and released from custody.

The suit alleges that Tate's beating, mistreating and failure to properly support his wife has continued throughout the couple's married life. She asked the court to enjoin him from molesting her, grant her a divorce, their furniture and enjoin him from disposing of funds they have in Central National Bank.
