## Social Hygiene Parley to Hear Dr. Alpenfels

Dr. Ethel J. Alpenfels, New York City anthropologist, will be the main speaker Friday, March 29, at noon at the Joint Social Hygiene luncheon in the Cleveland room, Hotel Cleveland.

The committee includes the Academy of Medicine, county medical association, and the Cleveland Health Council, a Welfare Federation organization.

Other sponsoring organizations include the Cleveland Council of P.T.A., the Division of Health, the Health Museum, the Mental Hygiene association and the Family Health association.

Dr. Alpenfels, professor of education at New York university, has traveled widely abroad and in this country studying family life in primitive areas. Once her travels took her to the Pacific islands where civilization is not far advanced.

She has written numerous pamphlets on removing racial barriers, including "Brethens All," a booklet distributed in several churches to aid brotherhood.

Following Dr. Alpenfels' talk, a panel of six teen-age boys and girls from Greater and suburban Cleveland will discuss "The Family."
