Woodson has recorded the dates and data of our struggle for a place in the democratic sun. struggle has been a noble one. Fighters For Freedom

FROM CRISPUS ATTUCKS who died on Boston Common for American freedom way back in Colonial days to the last young Negro American aviator to fall on the European battle fronts in this year of our war, 1945, the record of the Negro in democratic struggle has been a most worthy one. Fighters in every war, fighters in every good American cause from that of abolition and women's suffrage to that of the end of the poll-tax and the establishment of a permanent Fair Employment Practices committee, Negroes have been right there. Frederick Douglass, back in Abra-

ham Lincoln's days, was a fighter not only for the freedom of the slaves, but for the right of women to vote, as well. The Negro congressmen in Re-construction times fought not only for Negro rights at the polls but for the rights of all poor people. Dr. Charles Drew's contributions to blood plasma developments now in our time aid not only the saving of Negro lives but the lives of all Americans on the battle fronts of the world.

Negro History Week calls attention not only to achievements of value to , but of value to t he en democratic commonwealth of which we are a part. That is why Negro History Week should be observed not just by Negroes . . . but by all America. That observance is spreading and our its observance is spreading and our white fellow Americans are beginning to take part in it, is a portent of the growth of the power of the idea behind it. Woodson does not need high-powered showmanship and sensahigh-powered showmanship and sensa-tional publicity to put over the cause for which he labors. Behind him he has all the dignity and power of Negro history in America... and the world. history in America . . . and the world. That dignity and that power are considerable.
