Daddy Grace, talking with the chief of police by telephone from New York, Washington and Philadelphia, said the valuables were contained in a black brief case.

The ring which has two sets of diamonds on each side (32 Individual diamonds) and ten emeralds in the center, is reported to have been found on Jones on his apprehension.

Police have also questioned a Negro identified as E. B. Massey of Cleveland, Ohio. He allegedly told the officers he is the brother-in-law of Jones and once lived in Charlotte.
