The music was backed by Connie McLean's orchestra, direct from a tour of South America, a group of 10 musicians all handy at a variety of instruments and tunes and fairly bubbling with versatility.

A line of eight Harlem girls did some swell floor routines, captivating the audience with their "kill-er" number. Their work was smooth and included many difficult passages all in good taste.

The lovely to look at chorines, all capable of making the grade as Brown Skim Models, were: Frances Reeves, Bootsie Brown, Ollie Woods, Neverlee Grant, Lillian Hutchinson, Billie (Booby-eyes) Hayes, Adelle Sealey and Lillian Lovett.

The comedy was well handled by Seals and Miss Thompson, the bronze venus of the show world, who kept the house in an uproar from start to finish.

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Kahloah, who is described as an "import." did a short but very artistic dancing routine. Possessing nimble footwork and an uncanny sense of gyrations, she is an attraction that could fit in any smart spot. Her fast number is a mixture between a contortionist and a rhumba dancer well designed and presented for mass appeal.

Then there is Edith King, songird of the west, who indulges in some sophisticated song styling and does well for herself on the rhythm tunes.

The revue opened the early part of the week at the Capitol Theatre, Portsmouth, then moved to the Jefferson at Newport News where it was well received.

The heavy demand from the Portsmouth theatre-goers called for another midnight ramble Friday, and so heavy was each performance at the Booker-T. on Saturday until the revue had to do five shows instead of four.

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"Kaholah," who captivated Norfolk and the Peninsula with her exotic dancing, was born Elizabeth Kelly, and is a native of Chicago. In private life she is Mrs. Benn Polk, and has one daughter, Dolores, who is eight years of age.

She has been doing her specialty for six and one-half years. Started at the Grand Terrace in Chicago with Earl Hines. Lew Leslie gave her her first big break, also was the first to bill her as "Kahloah" when he starred her in the touring "Blackbirds of 1935."

RRNEST (Baby) SEALS

Seals started out with his own shown known as Seals and Mitchell's Melody Lane Girls. Joined the Brown Skin Models about five years ago, and has climbed to the top among the fun-makers. . . Has sold himself in theatres like the Golden Gate, in San Francisco; Sheas, in Toronto, Canada; Million Dollar, in Los Angeles, including the Majestic and Liehtman Theatre chains, and Canadian circuit.
