HARLEM ORGANIZATIONS READY FOR FESTIVE HOLIDAY SEASON

Numerous Churches, Civic and Social Units Prepare to Make Needy Families Happy

Trying bravely to ignore the ragged seams, rips and patches put there by the year-round struggle against want, privation and discrimna-tion. Harlem donned its own worn, festive attire and prepared for the holiday season this week.

The need for clothing, food and the pressure of exorbitant rents and scarcity of employment in Harlem this year have been the most important problems facing the community. Much has been said—little, actually, has been done to alleviate these conditions.

With churches, civic and social organizations in the vanguard, many groups in Harlem are bending every effort to make this Christmas season as happy as possible for needy families and underprivaleged children in the community.

Yet these organizations realize that they are able to give only superficial relief—that what is needed in Harlem is opportunity, so that the families they are helping this year might become self-custations getting.
