Rise In Negro Registrations Potent Way To Help Alexander

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the sixth in a series of articles detailing why it is so necessary for Negroes in all sections of the city to register and vote. In this series we will show where the Negro is the strongest and weakest, politically, and why the Negro registration should top 300,000.)

With Negroes all over the city aroused and incensed over the efforts of a collection of lawyers to drive from the Common Pleas Court bench the 1st Negro judge in history, an all-out campaign is underway to get all Negroes not registered on the registration rolls in time to vote to smash this "drive the Negro from the bench" movement.

Judge Raymond Pace Alexander is the target of the collection of lawyers who are doing everything they can to get rid of the first and only Negro Common Pleas Court judst. But Judge Alexander is finding, as time passed, that Negroes and liberal whites have no intention of leaving him in the lurch to fight

alone against his enemies, SUPPORT ALEXANDER

Practically everywhere a Negro lives the cry is, "Support Alexander! Get registered so you can vote for Judge Alexander in the Primary and the General Election! Judge Alexander deserves a full term on the Common Pleas bench and Democrats and Republicans can see that he gets a full term by registering and voting!"

Beginning Monday, March 2 traveling registrars will visit wards in which thousands of Negroes lives. Hundreds of those Negroes are not eligible to vote because they are not registered. The great majority of them will, however take the necessary steps to become registered now, for they realize that Judge Alexander will need every vote to defeat the movement to relieve him of his judicial portfolio.
